



#### China moves to extend ban to all materials

The Chinese government has released a proposal to completely ban imports of recovered fiber and every other form of "solid waste."

China's Ministry of Ecology and Environment on July 11 posted a draft document that lays out numerous regulations covering solid waste management. The official proposal serves as confirmation of recent industry discussion suggesting a full ban could be coming from China.



While China's National Sword policy has already shut

the door on most recycled plastics and mixed paper since the start of this year, higher grades of fiber have been allowed to continue to move into the country.

Fiber research firm RISI first reported on the latest import proposal, noting it would "entirely ban the import of solid waste, including recovered paper," and would do so sooner than previously anticipated.

The proposal was released in Chinese and an official English translation is not yet available. According to

## The China Crisis - Whose Crisis is It?

WASHINGTON DC, May 15, 2018— It is ourself and trash should look very different from

each other, but for years they have been converging in the U.S. China has not been the creator of today's crisis in the industry – U.S. mills have been complaining for years – but China's recent embargo of U.S. recycling imports is shining a mirror on our recycling industry and providing a clear signal that we can no longer pretend diversion of waste into a recycling bin is recycling.



#### **Exports begin to Slow to China**

#### Cardboard Markets Slow for Summer

Cardboard inspections slow the industry to a snail pace. Domestic Mills at capacity with increased volume on the market. Market is only open to Companies with Contracts.







SALT LAKE CITY — In the last five years, the use of cardboard has grown by 40% due to the booming e-commerce industry. A paper production company, Crossroads Paper, is looking to change the way Utahns recycle their cardboard.

Crossroads Paper has plans to construct a recycled-paper mill in Utah, expected to open in early 2022, the company announced Wednesday afternoon at the Red Butte Garden in Salt Lake City.



#### **Focus on Cardboard**

- Cardboard is the grade of the future. Many packaging companies are switching to brown grades to make packaging more recyclable.
- If your recycling program is suffering: Discontinue Plastics / Mixed Paper but keep the Cardboard.
- Online Shopping (Amazon) is creating excess cardboard and is a growing stream that is easier to capture than some items and is Growing!

## **Reformat Recycling**

### Reduction of Accepted Materials

Simplify Recycling by only accepting the "Basics".
Recycling many off grade items will be difficult to recycle.

#### **Cleaner Material**

Mixed Grades and Dirty
Materials are out. Industry will
need to adapt and create better
packaging products that are
more easily recyclable.

#### **Return to Domestic Markets**

Industry will adapt and in 1-3 years processing and manufacturing will increase to Local Markets in North America.
